1. CARE HOMES/CARERS & HOUSING.

A ban on "no-fault" evictions in England will be indefinitely delayed. This until after the court system is reformed, the government has announced. Ministers have been promising to end the right of landlords to evict tenants without needing a reason since 2019 (<u>BBC</u>).

Councils in England paying £1.7bn a year. This to house people in temporary homes. Annual cost would be enough to build about 100,000 new homes over five years, as families forced into cramped hostels and B&Bs (<u>Guardian</u>).

2.ECONOMY

The Autumn Statement. This will be delivered on Wednesday 22nd November. Ask your MP to ask the Chancellor to extend Cost of Living Payments to every older person receiving an income-based benefit, and provide extra financial support to reduce the impact of high energy prices this winter (<u>Click Independent Age</u>).



Newcastle Airport wins top award. It has been named airport of the year at the roots world conference hosted in Istanbul, Turkey (<u>Chronicle</u>).

Greggs. The company is on course for a record year of new shop openings and expects to add between 135 and 145 new shops this year (<u>Retail Gazette</u>).

3.HEALTH AND WELFARE



Pensioner Winter Fuel Payments. These ranges between $\pounds 250$ and $\pounds 600$, depending on how old you are and who you live with. Those born before the 25/09/43 will get $\pounds 600$. Those born 24/09/57 will get $\pounds 500$ (Bigissue).

Security with Dignity

UK pensions tax warning. Don't get caught by a tax bill. State pensioners could be paying tax net next year. With the income tax threshold frozen at £12,570 since 2021-22, anyone with a state pension next year of more than £242 a

week will have some tax to pay (Guardian).

Lack of dental access says Ashington MP. Between April 2022 and March 2023, 410 patients were seen in Northumbria Specialist Emergency Care Hospital's A&E with a dental abscess, caused by tooth decay, and 80 with dental caries (N/Gazette).

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5. POLITICS

Covid Inquiry. Former PM was described as "creating chaos and undermining everyone" by key aides in WhatsApp messages shown to the Inquiry. In a message sent by the former Cabinet Secretary, to the PM's chief adviser, he said he was "at the end of my tether" with the PM (Telegraph).

Covid hearing headlines about how the elderly were viewed by those whom we trusted with our lives (<u>Skynews</u>).

Mr Johnson's attitude to the elderly In particularly galling revelations for the families of those who died, <u>Mr Johnson's</u> <u>approach to older people</u> was raised during the hearings.

Notes from the government's former chief scientist Sir Patrick Vallance dated August 2020 described a "bonkers set of exchanges" with the prime minister, saying he was "obsessed with older people accepting their fate and letting the young get on with life and the economy going.

The key scientific adviser wrote: "[Mr Johnson] says his party 'thinks the whole thing is pathetic and COVID is just nature's way of dealing with old people - and I am not entirely sure I disagree with them. A lot of moderate people think it is a bit too much'. Another note from Sir Patrick shown to the inquiry and dated December 2020, revealed the influence of the wider Tory party on decision making in Number 10, saying while the PM had acted early and "the public are with him", a number of his MPs were not.

Public Services Report by Institute for Government. They say public services were performing worse than they did before the pandemic. This report, sets out the impact of the chancellor's plans on four service areas: the NHS, schools, the criminal justice system and local government (IFG).

Jarrow has been successful in securing this new 'Long-Term Plan' money. The government's Long-Term Plan for Towns, backed by £1.1 billion overall, will drive ambitious plans to regenerate 55 towns around the United Kingdom over the long-term through Town Plans (S/Gazette).

Councils in England face a funding gap of £4 billion. This over the next two years the Local Government Association reveals today. This is a £1 billion increase since the LGA's initial analysis in July as cost and demand pressures continue to rise (LGA).

6. POVERTY



SECURITY

Destitution. It's a word almost from another age, conjuring visions of desperate, grinding poverty. But it is a fact of life right now, for increasing numbers of people (approximately 3.8 m people), according to new research by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation (Channel 4 News video).

Homelessness in England is up 6.8% on the previous year - with thousands in temporary housing. The data, published by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, also reveals that the number of people facing homelessness because they received a so-called `no-fault' eviction notice increased by 27.4% to 24,260 (Euronews).

Where have all the judges gone? Trials delayed over staffing crisis. Senior MPs, former judges and campaigners have hit out at the "troubling" delays, saying they reflect a "perfect storm" of underfunding in the judiciary caused by "years of neglect" (Independent).



Police to crackdown on off-road bikes. The Northumbria chief constable told councillors in Newcastle that her force is just weeks away from deploying drones to follow riders of scrambler bikes causing nuisance across the North East (<u>N/Echo</u>).

8.TRANSPORT

North East bus passengers to gain from £15m Government funding boost. This as £2 bus fare cap extended. Transport Minister said, "Buses are vital to unleashing the potential of our town centres, and connecting people that would otherwise be isolated (<u>Chronicle</u>).

European Travel Information and Authorisation System. ETIAS authorisation is an entry requirement for visa-exempt nationals traveling to 30 European countries. Travellers headed to Spain, Italy, France and Portugal will soon require the important document to visit. This due in 2024 will be now delayed until 2025. (<u>Chronicle</u>).

Go North East bus workers went on indefinite strike from 28 October. This after rejecting the latest 10.3% pay offer by 81%. Their union said members were paid up to 20% less than those working for Go North West in Manchester (<u>ITV</u>).

Plans to close railway station ticket offices in England scrapped. The government U turn move came after a public backlash to the cost-cutting proposals. Over 750,000 responses in a public consultation, 99% of which were objections, according to the passenger watchdogs managing the survey (<u>Guardian</u>).
